RE: Advance Invitation: Joint Colville Lake-SRRB "Public Listening Session" on Dene Ragó2a (Hunting Laws) and Sahtú Approaches to Wildlife Harvesting January 21-23, 2020 in Colville Lake

Dear Sahtú Government Leaders, ?ehdzo Got'ıne Leaders, and ENR Representatives:

The Colville Lake Renewable Resources Council (Colville RRC) and the ?ehdzo Got'ınę Gots'ę Nákedı (Sahtú Renewable Resources Board - SRRB) invite representatives of the Sahtú Secretariat, Sahtú First Nation Councils, Land Corporations, ?ehdzo Got'ınę (Renewable Resources Councils) and ENR to a "Public Listening Session" (Hearing) on January 21-23 in Colville Lake.

This special gathering will focus on Dene ragó?a (hunting laws) and Sahtú approaches to wildlife harvesting.

The event is the first of five Public Listening Sessions which, together, constitute a Sahtú region-wide public hearing on emerging caribou conservation issues and community conservation planning processes for wildlife in the Sahtú region. We will be trying to answer the question, "What is the most effective way to conserve caribou?"

The Public Listening Session in Colville Lake will provide an important opportunity for Sahtú communities to continue to develop community caribou conservation plans and an approach based on the values and knowledge of Sahtú Dene and Métis. The Colville Lake Public Listening Session will be the basis for future SRRB decisions and recommendations about how we will continue to live with caribou in the Sahtú region.

The Colville RRC and SRRB will release a formal public notice in upcoming weeks, providing more detail about community and youth workshops and other preparation for the January gathering.

### **Background**

The SRRB is inviting each of the five Sahtú communities in turn to partner in a series of "Public Listening Sessions" (Hearings) over the 2020-2023 period. The Public Listening Sessions will address key emerging caribou conservation issues that have evolved in the Sahtú region since previous SRRB caribou hearings in 2007 and 2016.

The Public Listening Sessions will also support the ongoing development of best practices and models for community caribou conservation plans. Each Public Listening Session will focus on the host Sahtú

community's conservation planning process plus a key region-wide theme related to conservation planning.

For the Colville Lake Public Listening Session in January 2020, the key region-wide theme is **Dene ragó2a (hunting laws) and Sahtú approaches to wildlife harvesting.** The new *Dehlá Got'ine Tseduweh 2ade ?ah2ah* – Colville's caribou plan and harvest law – will be reviewed by the SRRB as part of this process.

In April 2015, the Sahtú communities gathered in Colville Lake to discuss caribou conservation issues. The Sahtú organizations present (SSI and all the Sahtú Band Councils, Land Corporations and ?ehdzo Got'ıne) passed joint resolutions supporting traditional Dene 2e2a (laws) on relationships with caribou and a Sahtú-developed caribou plan. (A copy of the 2015 Sahtú region-wide caribou resolutions is attached to this letter.)

The SRRB has, since then, been assisting each Sahtú community to develop its own community caribou conservation planning process. Déline completed its community caribou conservation approach, the Belare Wile Gots'é ?ekwé: Caribou for All Time plan, in 2016. This was reviewed by the SRRB in 2016 and resulted in the SRRB's hearing report on Bluenose East caribou conservation, ?ekwé hé Dene Ts'ılı - Sustaining Relationships which supported the Déline community conservation plan as the best approach to address caribou conservation concerns.

Colville is now completing the *Dehlá Got' ine Tseduweh ?ade ?ah?ah*. The January 2020 Public Listening Session is an opportunity for Colville to share its approach to community conservation planning. It is also an opportunity for other Sahtú communities to learn more about the Dehlá Got', ne plan, share their own plans, and participate in the discussion about Dene ragóza (hunting laws) and Sahtú approaches to wildlife harvesting.

Colville will share the final version of the *Dehlá Got'ne Tseduweh ?ade ?ahah* in October 2019. Colville and the SRRB are coordinating a workshop during the week of November 4-8 to assist each community to update its community conservation plan (to share with other Sahtú communities) and to prepare for the January Public Listening Session in Colville Lake.

The Colville RRC and the SRRB will circulate more detailed information in about two weeks, with the formal public notice of the Colville Lake Public Listening Session, more detailed information about the community conservation planning workshop in November, and more information about how to participate.

# Sahtu Caribou Meeting Resolutions

Colville Lake, April 22-23

#### Resolutions 1.1-1.3 - Governance

1.1 Any future caribou conservation decisions or restrictions must go to all the undersigned organizations in a public forum to ensure meaningful consultation. *David Codzi/Charles McNeely* 1.2 That the Sahtú region continue the traditional laws of relationship with caribou through a Sahtú-developed caribou plan including a process of self-regulation, driven by community-based monitoring and decisions. *Joseph Kochon/George Barnaby* 

1.3 That the Sahtú communities assemble together regularly to share knowledge and plans related to caribou in the Sahtú region, including celebrating our culture through traditional stories, music, dancing and cultural exchange. Alvin Orlias/Frederick Andrew

#### Resolution 2 - ?ehdzo Got'ine Funding

That SSI and SRRB seek funds for each of the RRCs to fulfill their mandate under Chapter 13 of the SDMCLCA, including:

- · Monitoring based on our traditional laws and knowledge
- RRCs' investigations, monitoring and collection of evidence as a basis for ENR enforcement
- Scientific research and monitoring, including the RRCs conducting herd counts based on traditional laws and knowledge
- Developing and implementing each community's caribou management plan

#### Resolution 3 – Caribou Tags

The Sahtú region rejects the current imposition of tags on aboriginal harvesters by ENR under the Wildlife Act Big Game Hunting Regulations for Bluenose West and Bluenose East caribou in the Sahtú Region, as there is no traditional knowledge or science-based evidence of a caribou population level such that conservation measures of this nature are required under the terms of the Sahtú Dene and Métis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement. #### Resolution 4 - Proposed Tundra Copper Exploration

We, the undersigned, with the support of the Sahtú Secretariat Incorporated, oppose the proposed Tundra Copper Exploration project until steps are taken to ensure the protection of the Bluenose East caribou calving ground; and that if caribou habitat and caribou are not properly protected, that we oppose this development. #### Resolution 5 – Caribou Collaring
