





Déline 2021 Virtual Public Listening Announcement and Information Requests

T_ich'ádíi hé Gots'edi (Living with Wildlife) Predators and Competitors

April 19-23, 2021

Notice to Sahtú leaders and the public, December 1, 2020

Background

The Déline Got'ine Government, Déline ?ehdzo Got'ine (Renewable Resources Council) and ?ehdzo Got'ine Gots'é Nákedi (Sahtu Renewable Resources Board - SRRB) invites participation in a Virtual Public Listening on *Tich'ádíu hé Gots'edi (Living with Wildlife) – Predators and Competitors* to be held during the week of April 19-23, 2021.

The event is the second of five Public Listening Sessions which, together, constitute a Sahtú region-wide public hearing on emerging caribou conservation issues and community conservation planning processes for wildlife in the Sahtú region, addressing the question, "What is the most effective way to conserve caribou?"

The Déline 2021 Public Listening Session will address the central question, "What should people's role be in maintaining healthy relationships between caribou and other wildlife?" We welcome interested individuals and organisations to apply for status as formally registered Parties.

To provide as much time for preparation as possible, this announcement includes a first round of Information Requests, as well as a timeline of activities for the 2021 Public Listening Session. The Information Requests relate both to the topic of "Predators and Competitors," and questions arising from the SRRB's Colville 2020 Public Listening Report, Sahtú Ragóza (Hunting Law) and Approaches to Wildlife Harvesting.

Information Requests

The SRRB requests that interested parties submit information and web links relevant to the central question of the Dél₁ne 2021 Public Listening Session. We also ask that parties provide responses to the following Round 1 IR questions by January 20, 2021.

Information Request (IR) 1.1:

Tıch'ádíı he Gots'edı – Caribou, Predators and Competitors

A. The Conservation Picture: Caribou, People and Planning

SRRB IRs to all interested parties

- 1. How are the caribou doing? Have you noticed any changes over the past year?
- 2. How are the people doing? Have you noticed any changes over the past year?
- 3. How is the community conservation planning approach progressing?

B. Predators

SRRB IRs to all interested parties

- 1. What stories or knowledge would you like to share about the past and present relationships between caribou, díga (wolf) and Dene/Métis?
- 2. Should people play a role in controlling díga populations to help caribou now? If so, what should this look like?
- 3. Are there any concerns that you have about other predators and their impacts on caribou?

C. Competitors

SRRB IRs to all interested parties

- 1. What stories or knowledge would you like to share about the relationships between caribou, rejire (muskoxen) and Dene/Métis?
- 2. Should there be more encouragement to harvest rejire for food security and commercial harvest, and to help caribou? If so, what should this look like?
- 3. Are there any other concerns that you have about other competitors and their impacts on caribou?

Information Request 1.2:

Sahtú Ragóra (Hunting Law) and Approaches to Wildlife Harvesting

The following IRs arise from SRRB decisions and recommendations from the Colville 2020 Public Listening Session.

SRRB IRs to all interested parties

- 1. The SRRB made five recommendations related to barren-ground caribou hunting areas in the Sahtú region (Recommendations 7.1-7.5). Further evidence is needed to address area boundaries appropriately with respect to community jurisdictions. How should the Sahtú region define jurisdictions for barren-ground caribou harvest regulation?
- 2. Oral submissions to the Colville 2020 Public Listening Session indicate that *Wildlife Act* residency provisions and hunter education remain a "hot topic" within the Sahtú region. The SRRB wishes to consider this topic at the 2021 Public Listening Session. What roles do

residency requirements and hunter education play in fostering or inhibiting respect for Dene harvesting protocols?
